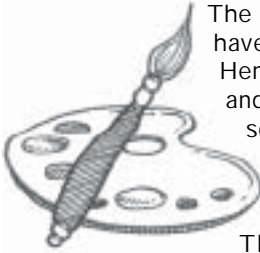

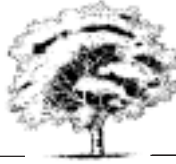

Weaning the “Babies”



Will feeding the ‘babies’ at Ladygate Farm

We have two types of suckler cows: the remaining dairy cows feed their own calf, and one to three other foster calves; and the beef cows just have their own calf. The dairy cows’ calves live in large pens and their mothers visit them twice a day to feed them.

The beef sucklers are treated differently. They all live together in a large shed just as they would if they were out in the fields. As a group they have a distinct pecking order and a strong bond between mother and calf, along with a wider bond

between all the members of the group.

The calves in the large group stay with their mothers until about two months before the cows are due to give birth again. If we didn’t remove the strong ten month old calves, they would continue to suckle their mothers’ right up until they gave birth again. This would mean that the cows wouldn’t get a rest, which can leave them thin and out of condition.

So, in early March, Will consulted his diary and decided that it was time seven of the “babies” were separated from their mothers. So I donned my boiler suit (essential for protection against being splattered with slurry), picked up my ash stick and went out into the yard to await instructions.

My job is usually to stand in the doorway while Will sorts the cows away from the calves. He will point to the ones that are to go and I have to jump out of the way as they come towards me, letting them out into the yard, or block ones with my stick that are not on the list. A stick is very useful as bovines seem to perceive it as an extension of the human arm, and if they do barge past me, only the stick gets banged not me.

So when the calves were successfully sorted, we drove them

down the yard to meet some new mates of similar size, already in the feed shed. There usually follows a few days of the cows and calves calling to each other, but it doesn't usually last long, in fact some of the cows wean the calves themselves when they are fed up with them, by kicking and butting them when they try to suckle.

So we are replicating a natural behaviour designed to protect the health of the cow in the later stages of her gestation. This two month rest enables her to put some weight back on and direct nutrients towards her unborn calf.

So after a few noisy days, peace has returned to Ladygate Farm.

In Search of the Northern Lights

Our adventure started at the Thomas Cook check in desk on a cold and frosty February evening. We two travellers armed with binoculars and cameras queued up with the other excited passengers to check in on flight number TCX 995G ready to fly off in search of the Northern Lights.

Once through security, we all assembled for a talk by the three astronomers who were to accompany us on our journey. They explained how particles from the sun travel towards us on the solar wind, and how when conditions are right, some of them get trapped in the Earth's magnetic field. As they encounter the Earth's atmosphere, they become visible and form the phenomenon we know as the Northern Lights.

They told us we were going to fly as far as the Shetland Isles and then the plane would fly in an ellipse so that firstly the left side of the plane would be facing towards the north where the display should be visible. Then the plane would turn around so that the people on the right side could see the display, assuming there was anything to see, he put our chances at 50/50.

Well, we took off and after a light meal the plane was plunged into darkness so that our eyes could become accustomed to the lack of light, they even put black tape over the no smoking signs! All travellers were abuzz with excitement as we neared our destination. Then one of the astronomers became very excited and started talking very fast into the microphone. "There it is a magnificent display, just look at that beautiful sight, look how it is moving and changing!" Those in the window seats on the left hand side of the aircraft gasped in awe at the wonderful sight. The Northern Lights spread out across the sky like a bright green fog, but as we watched ripples moved through it like a gentle breeze through fine net curtains. Then rays of colour started rising up from the main band forming tall pinnacles of light reaching upwards towards space. As they did, magnetic field lines were revealed through the Earth's atmosphere, almost as if they were being painted in the sky.

In fairness to all passengers, we had to rotate seats every few minutes so that everyone had the opportunity to see the display. This ongoing round of musical seats was accompanied by a constant running commentary from the excited astronomer on what we were experiencing in the sky, just as if he was a racing commentator at the Grand National.

When our side of the aircraft was pointing south we were treated to a beautiful sky, bejewelled with thousands of stars sparkling like diamonds in a perfect black sky, unspoiled by light pollution and cloud.

For nearly an hour the plane continued its elliptical journey and we continued to be treated to an ever changing display of the Northern Lights as it shimmered and changed constantly before our eyes. Mostly it was different shades of green, but we did see a little red at the base from time to time.

All too soon it was time to head for home, the aircraft headed south and the lights came on. We were all very tired when we landed back at East Midlands Airport, but all agreed it had been a wonderful trip.

Village Residents Parking Group (VRPG)



Report of the survey into ‘nuisance’ or ‘long-stay non-resident’ parking in Diseworth, between the periods 17th – 23rd December 2009 and 30th December 2009 - 5th January 2010.

Summary of Results.

- The results show that ‘long-term non-resident’ vehicles park predominantly in Clements Gate. Grimes Gate and Long Mere Lane were also used as parking areas but marginally compared to Clements Gate.
- A total number of 79 nights of ‘long-stay non-resident’ parking was recorded on Diseworth roads; 63 on Clements Gate, 14 on Long Mere Lane, and 2 on Grimes Gate.
- Page Lane and Clements Gate are the roads where most ‘residents’ park on the roadside.
- Clements Gate has most roadside parking when ‘residents’ and ‘non-resident long-term’ parking are added.
- There was no evidence of roadside vehicles with out-of-date road-fund license discs.
- There was some vandalism to vehicles but outside the survey period.

Some Main Conclusions.

- Clements Gate, on the evidence of this survey and anecdotal evidence, is the favoured ‘long-term’ parking road for non-residents. The adjacency of this road and Grimes Gate to the local bus stops is worthy of comment as is the fact that it is but a short walk, even with a suitcase, up Grimes Gate to the Airport terminals.

- It has been noted that other ‘non-resident long-term’ vehicles have parked on roads in the village but at times outside the dates of this survey. This includes roads cited as well as other roads in the village. Grimes Gate, for example, between The Cross and Iron Farm is more affected than this survey period shows.
- Members of the VRPG anecdotally feel that the ‘non-resident’ parking problem has diminished over the past several months probably influenced by the recession and the consequent reduction of services from EMA. This is reflected in the results returned in the survey. We predict that there will be an upturn in ‘nuisance’ parking in Diseworth when there is an upturn in flights at EMA.
- The evidence of the survey does not appear to support a residents’ parking scheme for the whole of Diseworth at present. It does highlight, however, that there are ‘hot spots’ of ‘nuisance’ parking where a measure of protection should be afforded to residents who are affected.
- This is the first set of ‘hard data’ that has been collected and is therefore a useful yardstick by which to measure the scale of future ‘non-resident’ overnight parking.

Summary of Recommendations

- Recommendations to the Parish Council are that they accept the findings of the report and its recommendations including setting up a meeting with LCC Highways, Police and EMA to revisit the problem of ‘nuisance’ parking in light of the conclusions of the report and consider solutions.
- Further recommendations are that the VRPG remain extant for future surveys, that current road markings are reviewed, that other PC’s in the locality of EMA be circulated the report and that the findings be published in the two village magazines.

The Parish Council met on the 4th March 2009 and accepted the findings and recommendations of the report.

LONG WHATTON & DISEWORTH PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



At the meeting in Long Whatton on 4th March, local Police Community Support Officer Nicola Stanhope reported that a current beat priority on speeding through Long Whatton was receiving regular attention, especially during peak traffic times. Many drivers had been “caught” and would receive appropriate action by police. She also described work being done with the school on road safety and anti social behaviour.

The Council received a comprehensive report and presentation from the Diseworth Village Parking Action Group which received praise from Councillors for all the effort put into their work. The Group’s recommendations for the next stage of the work (including publicising what they are doing) were endorsed by the Council.

The major campaign to try to save the out-of-hours Skylink service, now underway by the newly formed Bus Action Group, was discussed and everyone was urged to be involved and to take action. The Council agreed to finance some modest expenditure being incurred by the Group. In response to concerns about the lack of consultation by EMA on the proposals, it was confirmed that the Council had been consulted last October and had robustly responded with objections and other action. However it was generally accepted that the manner of the consultation (even though not a statutory requirement) left much to be desired and the decision by EMA to take the action proposed appeared to have already been taken by them.

A questionnaire from EMA was received with some amazement as it sought responses about how well it is doing in supporting the community. In view of its ill-timing and insensitivity due to their withdrawal of a vital bus service, an appropriate response from Councillors will be sent in reply.

The Council was pleased to receive an expression of interest in the vacancy for a Councillor for Diseworth Ward from David Bamford, who was duly co-opted to the office of Councillor.

The Chairman reported on the meeting held recently with members of the Coalville Cycling Club about the concerns of Long Whatton villagers. He said that it had been a useful meeting with a positive outcome. Thanks are to be sent to the Club and to Inspector Chris Brown for his role in enabling the meeting to take place.

The desire for allotments expressed some time ago by many people from both villages has now been turned successfully into progress towards acquiring the necessary land, in association with the affordable housing at Clements Gate, Diseworth. Decisions were taken to enable this to happen with the expectation that the land would be available at the end of the year, upon completion of the houses. Those who have expressed an interest are being kept informed.

It was agreed that, following a request, Long Whatton Cricket Club Juniors should be supported via a grant towards their festival this year.

It was agreed to accept proposals and a quote for the upgrading and ongoing maintenance of the gardens at The Cross, Diseworth.

Also, it was agreed to provide for the mowing and tidying of the verge on the approach to the Millennium Meadow to make walking there easier.

The recent survey of the use made of the bus stop at Turvey Lane, Long Whatton showed that it was very little used. The survey had been needed for evidence to support a grant application. In view of the results it was decided to shelve the project.

It was agreed to apply to have road salt bins installed at various locations at a cost to the

Council of £110 each. Highways will need to survey proposed sites and agree to the proposals.

A report on Long Whatton's School Travel Plan was received and in particular it was noted that improved highway safety and signage features would be part of the plan if implemented.

The Council decided to respond appropriately to a consultation on the County Council's proposals to dispose of care homes.

Long Whatton and Diseworth Parish Council Skylink Bus Service STATEMENT - 7th March 2010

The Parish Council and individual Councillors are currently receiving false accusations, misrepresentations and potentially libellous or slanderous communications based on ill-informed rumour and mis-information (deliberate or otherwise). The Council wants to attempt to stop this very unhelpful and counter-productive activity from progressing any further and also to reassure everyone that it is firmly on the side of those seeking to retain the out-of-hours bus service or an adequate replacement. Therefore the Council issues this Open Statement to provide a summary of the facts.

Prior to 22nd October 2009 it had been reported to the Council on several occasions that rumours about the possible curtailment of services had been circulating - originating from the bus drivers. The Council attempted to get to the bottom of this. A brief message from the bus company on 30th June 2009 to a Councillor stated that they were "looking at night patronage on Skylink" and would advise if anything happened. The County Council (as public transport co-ordinating body) had heard nothing.

On 22nd October 2009 a telephone call was received by the Clerk from Colleen Hempson of the Airport who wanted to "consult" the Council on their intention to divert the 7pm to 7am service via Kegworth due to potentially greater patronage by airport staff and passengers. Various figures were given to support this move. She said the consultation was out of

courtesy as there was no statutory requirement to consult. Councillors were immediately notified and the matter was placed on the agenda of the 5th November Council meeting (*item 9(e)*).

At the Council meeting on 5th November 2009 the matter was discussed both in Open Forum and specifically during the meeting, recorded at *minute 09158(e)*. The decision taken resulted in a strongly worded response to that consultation and the initiation of correspondence with the County Council seeking their assistance to either retain the existing service or if that proved impossible to ensure a replacement. Responses to this were negative. Subsequently, correspondence with the Member of Parliament and County Councillor brought replies that, while sympathising, each seemed to accept the inevitability of the Airport's intentions. *Reports of this matter at the meeting formed the lead paragraph of Parish Council News in the December editions of 'Long Whatton News' and 'Diseworth Dialogue' and on the Council's website.*

In a letter received on 11th December 2009 and reported to the meeting of the Council on 7th January 2010 (*agenda item 9(d)*) the Airport thanked the Council for responding to the consultation, set out its justification for its proposed action but regretted that it would be re-routeing the 7pm-7am service, expected to be from April 2010. An offer was made in the letter for representatives to attend the February meeting of the Council to explain this further. At this meeting the various responses were merely noted as this was certainly not seen as the end of the matter. The representatives would be invited to attend the February meeting.

At the meeting of the Council on 4th February 2010 Airport representatives Colleen Hempson and Anna Thompson attended and were vigorously quizzed by Councillors and about 30 members of the public for about one hour. There was a promise to investigate with the bus operator the possibility of joint evening working arrangements with Indigo as a partial compromise. *This is reported in the minutes of that meeting and in the lead paragraph of Parish Council News in the March editions of 'Long Whatton News' and 'Diseworth Dialogue' and on the Council's website.*

At the meeting of the Council on 4th March 2010 the Council received representations from a recently formed campaign group (Bus Action Group) and agreed to a request to support the group with some funding to cover some of its expenses. It was also agreed to respond vigorously to an ill-timed and insensitive questionnaire put out by the Airport. LWDPC, 7.3.10

The Benefits of Butter



Butter has been under fire lately; in fact it has often been regarded as a bad food said to contribute to heart disease and obesity, but the news on butter isn't all negative. In fact butter is an ancient food first made by nomads in the Middle East over 4000 years ago.

Butter and soft margarine both have the same amount of calories, 74 per heaped teaspoon, but butter contains about three times as much saturated fat as soft margarine, which may contribute to low density lipids in the blood, so called bad cholesterol. Despite its high saturated fat content, it is actually better for the heart than hydrogenated vegetable oil margarine, which contains trans fats, also known to raise bad cholesterol. On the plus side, butter contains natural forms of the health-giving antioxidants vitamins A, E and betacarotene.

Grass fed cows produce naturally yellow butter, so it has that lovely golden colour, especially during the spring and summer when the grass is at its best, sweet and full of nutrients. Margarine is naturally off white and has to be coloured to make it yellow. One of the problems with eating margarines that claim to be healthier than butter is that we probably eat more of it because we think it is less harmful than butter, and the flavour is disappointing compared to butter so we feel less satisfied.

A little butter added to potatoes or soup really brings out the flavour. An interesting fact is that we actually eat less butter now than during the Second World War. The weekly ration then was 110g per person and we now only consume about 40g of butter each per week. Because we are eating less butter these days, the butter mountain is growing again. Back in 1975 half a million tonnes were in storage, but that shrank to almost nothing as farm subsidies were altered. Now there are 80,000 tonnes in storage again, possibly due to the variety of other spreads now available.

Butter is a natural food which used in moderation can greatly enhance our enjoyment of food, but maybe we ought not to spread it too thickly on our toast and crumpets.

The classes were in school year groups and each entrant had to perform two contrasting pieces and many played two instruments.

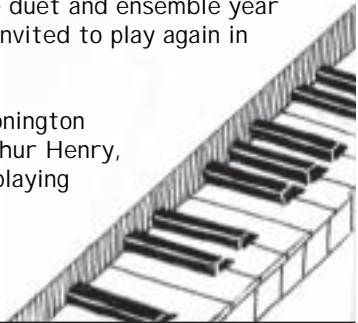
