No, I'm not being rude. That was one of my (late) Christmas presents. A voucher for a Charity called 'Who makes your pants' – who, not surprisingly given the name, make pants. It is owned and run by a friend of my brother-in-law, so I said I'd give a shameless plug – so, given that it is Valentine's day this month, here it is!

“whomadeyourpants? is about two things. It's about pants, gorgeous, not guilty, ethical pants. And it's about women. Amazing women who want work but who don't get many chances.

Here at whomadeyourpants.co.uk we think that every day should be a good pants day, and that there should be a little bit of something lovely under everyone's clothes, just for them. Underwear can make us feel beautiful, confident - even taller. We also think that it's not really on for anyone to be made to work in bad conditions just for a cheap pair of pants. How could that be right? Who could feel lovely in something made in a bad place?

So, we put these two things together and work with women here in the UK, women who have had very little opportunity, and we help them learn to make gorgeous pants, which you and we can wear, safe in the knowledge that they had a very happy start in life. We provide up front training in English if required, and then in sewing - every women who is accepted onto our course will go through an NVQ Level 2 in Manufacture of Sewn Products, and will be encouraged to train to be a team leader too. We hope that all jobs within the business can be filled by the women as they gain skills - if someone is interested in marketing, or finance, we'll arrange training.

All profits we make go back into the business - our costs aren't just about rent and fabric and wages, but about training and support and advice. We really do believe that pants can change the world - do you?”

I won't ask who bought any for their beloved...!

DAVID TAYLOR MP

– A TRIBUTE

David Taylor MP for North West Leicestershire who died suddenly on Boxing Day, was very well known throughout his constituency. He regularly attended meetings and social events, chatted to all, listened to worries and complaints and always acted on written requests. He had a remarkable ability to recall names, places and events.

David was a well known figure at many events in Diseworth & Long Whatton, whether it was presenting trophies at the two Annual Shows, speaking at Local History book launches or chatting to residents at coffee mornings. He was supported by a loyal team at the Coalville office of his constituency where he held his surgeries. Although these were formal appointments, David was prepared to speak to anyone who addressed him on concerns at any of the events he visited.

As a Member of Parliament he attended the House regularly and spoke on matters of social concern particularly on the needs of his constituents, and also chaired parliamentary committees. In 2007 David was named Backbencher of the Year. But in the villages he represented, David Taylor will be remembered as the MP who was known and highly respected by all whom he met regardless of their political persuasions.

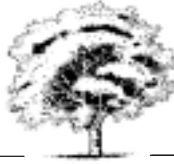

COUNTRY MATTERS

PIGEON WARS

In the winter nothing much seems to be happening in the crop fields, but theft and destruction can be taking place on a grand scale and the most likely culprits are wood pigeons. Just like the rest of the wild birds, pigeons can have a tough time in the winter when food is short. Fortunately for them, fields of autumn sown crops have usually grown enough by winter to provide them with a carpet of ready to eat greenery in the form of oil seed rape, wheat and barley.

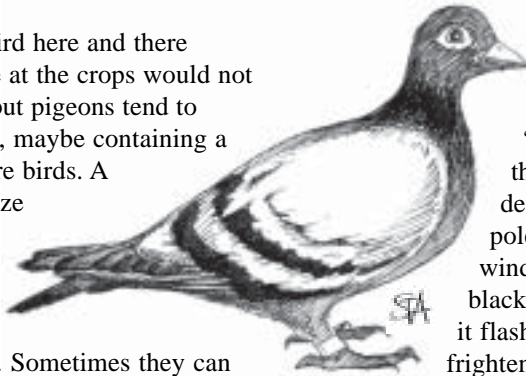
Now the odd bird here and there having a nibble at the crops would not be a problem, but pigeons tend to arrive in flocks, maybe containing a hundred or more birds. A group of that size feeding can cause significant damage to the dormant plants. Sometimes they can even eat some of the plants away completely and leave only bare earth in places. It wouldn't matter so much if they did the rounds and visited other fields in rotation, but no, they tend to come back again and again to the same place.

Farmers have always battled against birds eating their crops and their first

attempts at scaring them away were of course home made scarecrows. Now you are much more likely to see scarecrows at scarecrow festivals rather than in fields, but I have seen them standing to attention guarding crops, and they can be quite effective for a while. Their big disadvantage is that they don't move, and the birds eventually get used to them.

Now farmers have a wide range of weapons in their armory to help them battle against the pigeon problem. There is 'Flash Harry' a three sided rotating device on top of a pole that spins in the wind. Two sides are black and one orange so it flashes as it spins, frightening the birds.

There is also a ball on a pole that does the same thing. Then there is the "scary man", a pneumatic orange man who pops up at regular intervals. Some farmers tie paper streamers to poles, others have even tried tethered helium balloons! All these methods seem to be successful at least some of the time. Noise is another way of scaring pigeons, firstly in the



form of bangers tied at intervals on a slow burning rope. Light the end and retire to a safe distance, result, periodic bangs that sound like a gun going off. Secondly a gas fuelled banger placed in the field, and timed to go boom occasionally is also quite effective.

Of course all these methods just scare the birds away, usually onto a fellow farmer's field. Well, he doesn't want them either, so he will probably have his own armoury set up to scare them

off to another field. So the darn birds just keep moving from farm to farm. When I asked Will's opinion as to the best method, he said "A man with a gun". Well when you see how many pigeons are about nowadays, we could certainly do with losing a few.

I believe pigeon pie is quite tasty!

Strangely, bar stools seem quite comfortable at The Plough but extremely uncomfortable when sat on outside of their normal context. The one that I was sat on shared several things in common with me; both of us were way outside our normal comfort zone and neither of us particularly wanted to be on the stage at the Village Hall. My bar stool was making this particularly obvious by being as uncomfortable as possible. I had not got a clue what I was going to say to the hundred (or so) people in the hall when the lights were turned on and the curtains opened. Unfortunately, at that moment, the stage lights were turned on and the curtains opened.

Earlier in the year, I was sat on the same bar stool in the much more comfortable and less intimidating surroundings of The Plough. We were discussing what I should do for my Birthday party. I don't remember who suggested that we should put a band together but the idea stuck and the core members of the band were recruited. Duggan (obviously) would play guitar, Richard Mearns (obviously) could sing. All we needed was a keyboard player, a bass player and someone to play the drums. The fact that no one that we knew could actually play any of these instruments didn't seem to matter. After all, we had four or five months to learn and it couldn't be difficult. Then Steve Frost walked in and started tapping on the bar... Now we had a drummer.

The next day, Kev Brown went out and bought a bass guitar and a "Teach yourself bass" book. John Clark picked up a seriously amazing spangly green Epiphone Les Paul guitar and signed up for a series of guitar lessons. Slowly over the next few weeks, much to Judy's annoyance, a drum kit, several amplifiers, speakers and a rather large keyboard were delivered to my house. Half of the contents of my garage were deposited in a skip and all the gear was set up in my garage ready for practicing. Content that all was working out rather well, I went to Sweden for a couple of weeks.

The first practice session was an absolute disaster. Kev and Richard couldn't make the session but Duggan, John and I spent a few hours running through a few possible songs. We sounded terrible. It was fairly obvious that we needed to do something radical if we were going to put a live gig on in about four month's time. Therefore, I booked the Village Hall for the night of the party, bought a bigger amplifier and a "teach yourself drums" DVD for Frosty and went to Sweden for six weeks to panic quietly on my own.

I got back from Sweden and we organised a few more practice sessions. We still sounded terrible. However, it was obvious that the guys had been practicing. We spent a couple more evenings trying out several possible songs and recruited Aaron Smith to come and help us out. I knew Aaron had a saxophone and an acoustic guitar and was therefore comparatively over-qualified to be in the band. We tasked him with learning how to play the keyboards.

After I returned from another trip to Sweden, Aaron turned up at my garage for the next practice session absolutely note perfect. Kev had to drop out because we couldn't find a

time that both he and I were in the same country at the same time and so Gary Willacey joined us on bass. Gary slotted straight in and from the first night that he turned up things started to go from strength to strength. I found a blues number that wasn't too difficult and Aaron spent about 35 seconds learning to play it on the sax. Despite my attempts to do a reggae version, Duggan re-arranged the Metallica version of "Knockin' on Heaven's Door" and we therefore had a set that, with a little bit of talking between numbers, would last nearly 15 minutes. It was fairly obvious that in the remaining month or so that we had left, we would not be able to put a complete evening of music together - so we hatched a plan. We would do half a dozen or so long numbers and get a professional in to do the rest of the evening. What we needed was a really good entertainer that was reasonably well known but that would fit in with the band and not make us look like complete idiots. I went back to Sweden to consider options.

John Otway had his first hit called "Really Free" back in the 70's and quickly gathered a cult following when he jumped onto (and promptly fell off) an amplifier during a live set on the Old Grey Whistle Test. I first saw him at a festival in 1978 when he climbed up a lighting tower, got stuck and had to have the fire brigade rescue him. Many albums and tours later, he achieved a second chart success and a spot on Top of the Pops with "Bunsen Burner" which entered and exited the chart at number 9 in 2002. There is general speculation that one reason for this was that he recruited 1,000 of his fans to sing "House of the Rising Sun" on the B side of the single and credited each one on the cover - therefore ensuring that they would all buy two copies each - one for themselves and one for their mum. Others have speculated that he managed to increase sales by simultaneously releasing three different versions with the same A side. Whatever the reason for its chart success, this second hit led to an album entitled "John Otway's Greatest Hits" and (as he proudly told me after the party) enabled him to get the "s" on the right side of the word "hit". Otway has quite a big following in the village - several people have seen him at Glastonbury and others had seen him when he was on tour a couple of years ago with the Hamsters, Wilco Johnson (Dr. Feelgood), Norman Watt-Roy (The Blockheads) and Richard Hogarth (Eddie and the Hotrods).

Therefore, John Otway was recruited as the main act. We put together a version of "The House of the Rising Sun" which sounded moderately similar to his version and bought me a Stylophone for my solo as I couldn't compete with Duggan on the guitar. We hatched a complicated plan to keep Otway's appearance a total secret and trick the audience into thinking that we would invite Alison Evans and Rob Green onto the stage to sing it with us (sorry guys) but surprise everyone by actually introducing Otway instead. Unfortunately, our plan to smuggle him in to the Village Hall half way through the gig meant that we literally had 10 minutes or so to practice the song with him beforehand. Not a problem - after all, it couldn't be that difficult.

A few new songs were added to the set list - we put together an acoustic version of Hotel California which made my fingers bleed during the practice sessions and meant that Aaron now had to learn the bass guitar whilst Gary and Frosty played a range of hastily bodged up percussion instruments. Judy had been practicing "You Belong To Me" and we started to put an arrangement together around that. Kev rejoined us on vocals for a couple of songs whilst Chard was tasked with learning all 173 verses of American Pie.

Next came the name – Incognosis – and a thorough and highly efficient marketing campaign run by Nicole Simms and Duggan which included logos, T Shirts and security passes for band and crew. Catering and bar was organised courtesy of The Plough and I must say that Rob and Rachael coped admirably with my micro management of the menu and bar arrangements.

We set all the gear up at the Village Hall a couple of days beforehand but had to perform a sort of Fawlty Towers style sketch moving kit from the stage to the hall, from the hall to the committee room and then back on the stage again as we manoeuvred around all of the other people that had booked the hall during the week. I must both thank and apologise to the drama group, Anna Groves, the Parish Council and especially Dave Adcock for messing you all around so much.



On the day of the gig, Johnny “JC” Cross arrived at the hall just after lunch time and put together a complete keyboard accompaniment in about half an hour (damn professionals eh?). After pouring a bottle of Grolsch into my notebook computer and rendering half of the lighting rig useless, I nipped off to the train station to collect Otway. Otway was late and when I got back, we did a 10 minute run-through of a couple of numbers. No one mentioned that this was the first time the whole band had actually played the same songs together in the same place, at the same time and in (more or less) the same key. Then the whole band rushed down the pub for some Dutch courage and a pep talk from Otway – who turned out to be as scared as we were.

Half an hour later, I found myself sitting on a slightly uncomfortable and argumentative bar stool on the Village Hall stage, wondering what the hell I was going to say to the hundred (or so) people in the hall when the lights were turned on and the curtains opened. Unfortunately, at that moment, the stage lights were turned on and the curtains opened.

The whole event was captured on video by Nicole and has been edited into an extremely



professional DVD which is available from either myself or Chris Duggan. The incognosis.com web site will be on-line in a while and you will be able to sign up for the band fan club, track our progress and acquire band merchandise. I don't think we could ever repeat the birthday gig but we are going to try. Therefore, if there is anyone that has a garage or a small barn that they would be interested in renting, we are looking for a rehearsal room.

My most sincere thanks and appreciation go to the band and the crew that helped me to celebrate my birthday in such a good way - Rob and Rachael and their team from The Plough for sorting out the catering, Dave Adcock for sorting out the hall, Nicole Simms for adding all the extras that really helped to bring the evening together and of course John Otway for being – Otway.

Judy, your courage and determination were matched by your performance and your choice of song was perfect. I do and always will, belong to you.

Finally, Aaron Smith, John Clark, Steve Frost, Kev Brown, Gary Willacey, Richard Mearns, JC and of course Chris Duggan – you are and always will be - Incognosis.

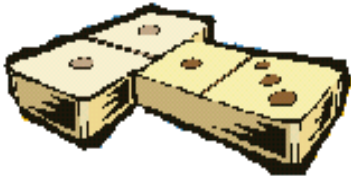

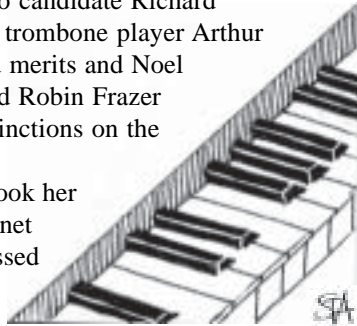
Practical music exams took place on Monday 7th December at Castle Donington Community College and once again the students have done extremely well.

LONG WHATTON & DISEWORTH PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



December

Prior to the meeting on 3rd December the Councillors had received representations from a number of Clements Gate, Diseworth residents who were concerned about the planning application for six affordable homes proposed to be built at the end of their road. At the November Planning Group meeting the application had been examined in detail and the Councillors had considered it to be a well designed and very appropriate design for the purpose. No objection had been raised as no specific planning issues could be found. The proposal was in accordance with the wishes of the village, as expressed in the Parish Plan and subsequent Housing Survey, that affordable homes were needed.

Eight of the residents attended the December meeting and questioned the manner in which the Parish Council had arrived at its decision, there having been “no consultation”. During a lengthy and sometimes heated discussion, a full explanation of the procedures covering planning consultations by planning authorities was given. In particular it was explained that it was the planning authority (North West Leicestershire) which was responsible for consulting parish councils, neighbours and others - not the Parish Council. The Parish Council always ensured as far as was practical within the fixed timescale permitted that there was public notice of everything it was to discuss and that all meetings were open to the public, as required by the legislation. Councillors said they shared the residents’ frustration that it sometimes seemed that very little notice was taken of their views by the planning authority but, in turn, that was due to very rigid government legislation. The Rural Housing Enabler and representatives of the Housing Association were present and they assisted the discussion by explaining the process leading to the proposed development, with a reassurance that the properties would be only for local villagers’ benefit, whose need had been established in the Survey.

Towards the end of the discussion the Chairman promised that, as all Planning Group decisions were open to review at the following Council meeting, the residents’ comments would be considered when reviewing the earlier decision. He also urged the residents to send in their own observations or objections directly as these were just as valid as those of the Council. Subsequently Councillors did review their decision in the light of the representations received and resolved that a further response be sent to the planners confirming that the Council had no objections but giving the Council’s considered views on each point raised by the residents.

Briefly, other matters decided at the meeting included making grants to Diseworth Church towards repairing a fence which had blown down and to Pride Alarms to provide a further alarm for a vulnerable property. There had so far been a disappointing response to

representations about the threatened loss of the early morning and evening bus services; a reply was awaited from David Taylor, MP. It was agreed that the Council enter a Christmas Tree for the Long Whatton Church Christmas Tree Festival and noted that the school in that village was actively seeking to start a school travel plan. It is expected that in the new year a new Community Speedwatch will be offered for which new volunteers will be required.

**Councillors reported that those residents who had signed up for the Council's new Village.Mail news service were very pleased. It's easy to do - just send an email to longwhatdisepc@hotmail.com with 'Village.Mail' in the subject line.

January

There is now a vacancy for a Councillor due to Simon Adcock's resignation at the January meeting, as his work is taking him away from Diseworth. Simon was thanked for his service to the Council and was wished well for his future. The vacancy has now been declared and anyone who would like to step into his shoes is welcome to express an interest. The Clerk will be pleased to provide information by phone, letter or email. There will be the statutory notices and anyone wishing to express an interest in filling the vacancy is asked to tell the Clerk or a Councillor.

The budget for 2010/11 has been decided and £29,000 will be required from Council Tax payers to meet the expected expenditure. This year there are some specific requirements causing an increase, including the anticipated costs of providing allotments, a bus shelter and to meet increasing requirements of local organisations for occasional financial assistance. In this case, any such requests should be made prior to the budget-making process which begins in November each year. Also the Clerk has been asked to work an additional 2 hours per week to better deal with the Council's administration. Having investigated the possibility during the past year, plans for a footpath to Millennium Meadow were abandoned but the Council will seek to include some mowing and clearance of the verge within the maintenance contract.

Councillors expressed sadness at the untimely death of David Taylor MP, who had given a great deal of support to local people. A letter of condolence had been sent on behalf of the Council.

It was agreed to support in principle a request for financial help to purchase a speed detection device by the local police though more information is required. A year ago the Council supported a proposal to extend the Clearway from the A453 part-way down the two roads into Diseworth. The County Council now has the proposal out for formal consultation and no objections were raised.

JUST A THOUGHT!

What's Yours? (October Edition 2009)



I've been waiting for the flurry of responses to the invitation to comment upon 'our' 'divisive' system of government for the past couple of issues before I entered the lists myself.

To date there has been no dialogue in the '*Dialogue*' but I do hope we can get something going not only because I believe this to be a worthy topic for comment but also, in your otherwise excellent publication, it would be refreshing to establish a more consistent place for an exchange of views and debate.

I realise that there have always been opportunities for this and it is up to your readership to be enthused and motivated enough to write to you. This is bound to depend on issues that 'fire' people up and in the absence of other local outlets for expressing opinion (ah! the lamented passing of the NuNews) the *Dialogue* has become more prominent with potential for such exchanges.

If I have one reservation about this particular topic, your writer has asked us to respond to a 'national' rather than a 'local' matter. In an 'election' year, however, and about a topic that affects us all, it would appear appropriate for comment to appear in our village magazine.

If we dwell solely on the events of the past year or so it would appear that '...our method of forming and running a government *has* become an anachronism.'

To begin with I would argue what really needs careful thought is building a fairer system for electing a group for governing. The rest needs to follow from that!

I'm not a paid up member of the Electoral Reform Society but I have sympathy with their views calling for a complete overhaul of our system. When we realise that 'Currently only 1 in 3 MP's can claim support from over half of the voters in their constituencies under the first past the post system'¹ then there is surely something unfair here.

And, 'In the 2005 election, one party won 600,000 votes in the UK but no seats at all. Another party, which won less than half this number of votes, won nine seats. The election results depends as much as where your supporters live as how many you actually have.' ¹

Aristotle (384-322BC) put it this way:-

“If liberty and equality as is thought by some are chiefly to be found in democracy, they will be best attained when all persons alike share in government to the utmost.”

I'm aggrieved that the expenses scandal and the actions of some MP's have brought discredit on parliament. It's no small wonder that many decent, hard working, honest people are deeply angered by the apparent greed of those they have elected to represent them. This has damaged our democracy and the fear is that people will not turn out to vote if they believe that they cannot trust the persons who put themselves up for election.

I know that I have not addressed all the points raised in your writer's article but there are many issues and we could get stuck in the detail of these and miss what I have identified, I believe, as one of the major problems we have to struggle with.

I hope others will join the debate. We are in need of a fairer system of electing people to parliament and through that we seek a fairer society for everyone. This is what democracy is about. Some will say this is idealistic but I believe we have to reach upward and aim for the highest and the best. Then we might get somewhere near!

Yoghurt, A Natural Boost For Your Immune system

Nothing makes more difference to our health than a well functioning immune system. It can save us from all manner of problems, from minor infections to cancer.

It's true that genetic makeup strongly influences immunity, but diet has a large part to play in keeping our immune system functioning properly. One food that comes top of the tree for boosting the immune system is yoghurt. Apparently, if you do nothing else to help your immune system, at least eat yoghurt regularly.

It has long been known that yoghurt can kill and disable bacteria, but more recent research reveals that yoghurt also helps to give a wide ranging boost to immune system functioning. Studies on humans and animals show that yoghurt can stimulate production of gamma interferon, boost activity of natural killer cells and speed up production of antibodies. Research in Italy found that yoghurt was as effective as the synthetic drug, Levaelsol in stimulating immune functioning. A large scale study carried out at the University of California School of Medicine, revealed that people eating 450gms of live yoghurt a day over a four month period, had five times more infection fighting gamma interferon in their blood than non yoghurt eaters. A year long follow up study found that eating only 170gms of yoghurt per day helped to prevent colds, hay fever symptoms and diarrhoea. Even when the yoghurt has been heated or frozen, so killing off the live cultures, it still has a profound effect on immunity.

In one experiment, mice had ordinary supermarket yoghurt added to their diet. They were then infected with cancer cells. Eating the yoghurt dramatically reduced the expected numbers of cancers by a third. Even yoghurt that has been heated up enough to destroy 95% of the live culture still had cancer preventing properties.

So popping a few yoghurts in our shopping trolley could be one of the best ways keeping our immune system healthy.

Note from PCSO 6178 Nicola Stanhope

Due to the number of door to door sellers being reported to the Police recently, we have provided a 'We do not open the door to unexpected callers' notice for residents in Diseworth to display in their windows and doors.
